# Finding Jewish Roots: Immigration and Old World Records



Ancestry has more than 20 BILLION records in more than 32,000 databases. Join Crista Cowan for a look at her process of searching and researching, specifically as it relates to Jewish Immigration from the Old Country into the United States and Canada.

### Research in the "New Country"

- → Don't jump to "old country" records until you have exhausted all "new country" records.
- Review records you've already collected with fresh eyes.
- Treate timelines to coordinate your analysis of information and improve the likelihood of identifying the correct individuals in the records.
- Treate both given and surname lists to account for name changes and possible spelling variants.
- Naturalization documents are more identifiable than passenger lists and often contain details about immigration including date, ship and port of arrival.
- Almost all surviving U.S. and Canada passenger lists are available on Ancestry.
- → Utilize FAN club research strategies.
- When identifying a home town, be careful to identify the correct one. Many times there are towns with the same or similar names even in a single country.

### Research in the "Old Country"

- → Once you've identified the home town, learn everything you can about the history of the location.
- Remember that name might not be as unique as you think it is.
