President's Message...

I recently returned from a wonderful trip to Hawaii and like one and one half million other people, I had to visit Pearl Harbor, the final resting place for most of the 1,177 sailors and marines who died on the Arizona. Their head stone, if you will, is but a small rusty part of the ship that sticks up above the sea and reminds those that look that this indeed is the final resting place for the Arizona and its crew. There were Jewish men among those who gave their lives on the Arizona. I stood and read the names engraved on the memorial wall of those who went down with the ship.



After the cruise something kept going around in my head: It was easy for me to visit the cemetery in Nashville, TN and show my grandsons where their ancestors are buried. Some of you can do the same by visiting cemeteries in other parts of the country, or even go back to Poland or Germany. The point is you have a place, a final resting place to go to, to take your children and grandchildren. But for many it will be only a memorial in the Pacific Ocean or a black granite wall in Washington, DC with a name printed on it as the final resting place. Certainly not the same feeling.



MEET THE RECORDING SECRETARY

Organizations such as the JGSGO are not run by a CEO or a high priced paid director, but by a handful of dedicated volunteers. One such person on the Board of Directors of the JGSGO is Riva Sorokurs, the Recording Secretary.

Riva was born and raised in St. Paul, MN. Her educational background includes attending the University of Minnesota, College of Science, Literature and Arts, earning an Associate in Liberal Arts. Her education continued one year beyond the degree and included assorted short courses in pre-school education and law.



Riva moved to Florida from Minneapolis and has lived in Winter Park, FL, for over 30 years. She taught at the Temple Israel Nursery School for several years. Under her watchful eye, minutes of board and regular meetings have been maintained and made available in a timely manner.

FGS CONFERENCE ROUNDUP

(Note: JGSGO is a member of the FGS Federation of Genealogical Societies)

September 7 – 10, Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS; <http://www.fgs.org>) annual conference was in the heart of US genealogical research: Salt Lake City, home to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints' Family History Library (FHL) <http://www.familysearch.org>) -- which extended its hours during the event.

Around 1,400 people attended, a number likely buoyed by residents of the family history-minded city. Following are this year's conference highlights--and it's not too early to start planning for next year's extravaganza Aug. 30-Sept. 2 in Boston:

The FHL announced plans to index the microfilmed records in its Granite Mountain Vault and put the indexes online. The secure, climate-controlled bunker, carved from a mountain in Utah's Little Cottonwood Canyon, stores 2 million rolls of film bearing records of 110 countries. The library needs help from an estimated 100,000 volunteers by the end of 2006 to create the indexes using a new online system. At the FGS conference, FHL staff offered a sneak peek of the system and recruited volunteers to test it on records from Georgia, Ohio and Mexico. When the actual indexing gets underway, says FamilySearch spokesperson Paul Nauta, the microfilms genealogists most often request will be top priority. He adds the FHL isn't yet ready for an influx of volunteers. Stay tuned to the E-mail Update newsletter--we'll let you know when you can sign up to help. (On another note, pop over to FamilySearch and check out its redesigned home page.)

This fall, MyFamily.com will improve its subscription database site Ancestry.com (<http://www.ancestry.com>) with features including a Recent Activity section (so you can pick up a research session where you left off), better-integrated saving of search results, a new community section and more. According to MyFamily.com, the updates result from 18 months of surveying customers.

As we mentioned in the Sept. 1 E-mail Update, which you can read at <http://www.familytreemagazine.com/newsletter/archive.html>, several genealogy software companies unveiled new versions at the conference: Family Tree Maker (<http://www.familytreemaker.com>), Legacy Family Tree (<http://www.legacyfamilytree.com>) and RootsMagic (<http://rootsmagic.com>). Add The Master Genealogist to that list--see <http://www.whollygenes.com/tmg.htm> to learn about the program's improved look, DNA test result logging

and easier data entry.

In other software news: Producers of GenSmarts (<http://www.gensmarts.com>), which offers research guidance based on information in your genealogy program, have increased the utility's knowledge base with titles from the FHL's US film and book collection. Now GenSmarts can look at dates and locations in yourfamily files and suggest FHL resources for you to consult.

Progeny Software (<http://www.progenysoftware.com>) has updated its Personal Ancestral File Charting Companion with colored charts. FamilyKey, a new program for creating family history Web sites, is in beta testing--you can preview it at <http://www.familykey.com>.

If you're interested in using DNA in your roots research, or you're in charge of a surname project, you'll want to meet a new kid on the block: The International Society of Genetic Genealogy is a free educational group that offers networking and resources. We especially like the DNA testing company comparison charts on its Web site, <http://www.isogg.org>.

IAJGS CONFERENCE HELD IN LAS VEGAS

The 25th IAJGS (International Conference on Jewish Genealogy) was held at the Flamingo Hotel, Las Vegas, July 10 through 15th. Coming from throughout the world, approximately 600 "genealogists" registered for the conference.

Many prominent and well known genealogists were lecturers. Their lectures were taped and are available on a 3CD set (\$35.00). Order through www.Jewishgenmall.org.

In a report on the conference appearing in the *Dorot* published by the JGS of NYC, Linda Cantor, Secretary of the JGS Executive Council wrote, "One of the best features of attending a conference is the chance to network with other genealogists who share your areas of interest." As a result, she attended several meetings and luncheons of Special Interest Groups (SIG) including Galicia, Ukraine, Lithuania, Latvia and South Africa.

In the same issue of *Dorot* (Spring 2005) Karen S. Franklin of the Leo Beck Institute wrote, "The (Honorable Oscar Goodman) Mayor of Las Vegas had the crowd in stitches as he described his antics, upon arriving in office, in attempting to secure roles in movies shot there. The speech of this Jewish, former self-admitted mob lawyer, who today administers one of the fastest-growing cities in the entire country, was one of the highlights of the convention—at least for this participant."

Franklin also described the general session as a highlight in which it was announced that new advanced search capabilities are available on the All Country Databases on Jewishgen.org. She wrote, "you can search with multiple fields and by specific given names as well as by surnames by geographic regions and sub-regions, specify search criteria for each field using a 'sounds like' criteria, and filter by date. Its capabilities and possibilities continue, offering extraordinary opportunities for experts as well as beginners. While no search features have been subtracted for Jewishgen users, this new feature is available only to donors of \$100 or more. This income is needed in order to maintain and assure smooth service to thousands of users."

Franklin concluded her comments with, "I am looking forward to New York next year – for I can only imagine the multitude of genealogical experiences of Las Vegas magnified in the Big Apple."

How old is Grandma?

Recently, one evening a grandson was talking to his grandmother about current events. The grandson asked his grandmother what she thought about the shootings at schools, the computer age, and just things in general.

The Grandma replied, "Well, let me think a minute, I was born before: television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, Frisbees and The pill. There was no: radar, credit cards, laser beams or ball-point pens. Man had not invented: pantyhose, air conditioners, dishwashers, clothes dryers and the clothes were hung out to dry in the fresh air and man hadn't yet walked on the moon

Your Grandfather and I got married first, . . . and then lived together.

Every family had a father and a mother.

Until I was 25, I called every man older than me, "Sir". And after I turned 25, I still called policemen and every man with a title, "Sir."

We were before gay-rights, computer-dating, dual careers, daycare centers, and group therapy. Our lives were governed by the Ten Commandments, good judgment, and common sense.

We were taught to know the difference between right and wrong and to stand up and take responsibility for our actions.

Serving your country was a privilege; living in this country was a bigger privilege.

We thought fast food was what people ate during Lent.

Having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with your cousins.

Draft dodgers were people who closed their front doors when the evening breeze started.

Time-sharing meant time the family spent together in the evenings and weekends-not purchasing condominiums.

We never heard of FM radios, tape decks, CDs, electric typewriters, yogurt, or guys wearing earrings.

We listened to the Big Bands, Jack Benny, and the President's speeches on our radios.

And I don't ever remember any kid blowing his brains out listening to Tommy Dorsey.

If you saw anything with 'Made in Japan' on it, it was junk.

The term 'making out' referred to how you did on your school exam. Pizza Hut, McDonald's, and instant coffee were unheard of.

We had 5 & 10-cent stores where you could actually buy things for 5 and 10 cents.

Ice-cream cones, phone calls, rides on a streetcars and a Pepsi were all a nickel.

And if you didn't want to splurge, you could spend your nickel on enough stamps to mail 1 letter and 2 postcards.

You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600 . . . but who could afford one?

Too bad, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.

In my day: grass" was mowed, coke" was a cold drink, "pot" was something your mother cooked in and "rock music" was your grandmother's lullaby. Howard Gold, a member of JGSGO since 1998, shared the following information about the cover photos.



SOFTWARE FOR JEWISH ROOTS RESEARCH

If you have Jewish ancestors, you might need to record Hebrew names, Jewish dates, Holocaust information and other special data. The creators of DoroTree software (<http://www.dorotree.com>), which recently introduced version 2.1, incorporated features for Jewish researchers, such as:

- * a virtual keyboard that lets you enter data in Hebrew, even if your computer doesn't support Hebrew characters
- * a date converter that changes dates from Hebrew to civil (the Jewish day starts at sunset, while the civil day starts at midnight)
- * a Holocaust symbol so you can mark victims in your database
- * direct Internet access to Jewish genealogy sites
- * a first-name converter that shows you Hebrew names
- * a Pages of Testimony form for submitting ancestors' names to Yad Vashem, the Jerusalem-based Holocaust remembrance organization established in 1953.

Like other genealogy programs, Dorotree lets you create family Web pages, add photos to your files and import or export GEDCOMs. (GEDCOM is the universal file format for family tree files.) It costs \$59 plus shipping, and is compatible with Windows 98 and higher.

All European life died in Auschwitz

(*) *This is a summary of an article recently printed in a Spanish newspaper, but it applies to most countries of western Europe.*

I walked down the street in Barcelona, and suddenly discovered a terrible truth - Europe died in Auschwitz.

We killed six million Jews and replaced them with 20 million Muslims. In Auschwitz we burned culture, thought, creativity, talent. We destroyed the chosen people, truly chosen, because they produced great and wonderful people who changed the world.

The contribution of this people is felt in all areas of life: science, art, international trade, and above all, as the conscience of the world. These are the people we burned. And under the pretence of tolerance, and because we wanted to prove to ourselves that we were cured of the disease of racism, we opened our gates to 20 million Muslims, who brought us stupidity and ignorance, religious extremism and lack of tolerance, crime and poverty due to an unwillingness to work and support their families with pride.

They have turned our beautiful Spanish cities into the third world, drowning in filth and crime. Shut up in the apartments they receive free from the government, they plan the murder and destruction of their hosts.

And thus, in our misery, we have exchanged culture for fanatical hatred. creative skill for destructive skill, intelligence for backwardness and superstition. We have exchanged the pursuit of peace of the Jews of Europe and their talent for hoping for a better future for their children, their determined clinging to life because life is holy, for those who pursue death, for people consumed by the desire for death for themselves and others, for our children and theirs.

What a terrible mistake was made by miserable Europe.

ARMENIAN HEIRS RECEIVE MAJOR FINANCIAL SETTLEMENT

French insurance company Axa SA has agreed to pay \$17 million to settle a suit filed by descendants of Armenians killed 90 years ago in the Turkish Ottoman Empire.

It was the second case settled in the past 15 months claiming that relatives of people who died were not paid benefits after the death of 1.5 million Armenians from 1915 to 1923. The latest agreement reached between Axa and heirs to policy holders, will be considered for final approval November 14 by a federal judge. The judge last year approved a \$20 million settlement between New York Life Insurance Co. and heirs of 2,400 policyholders. Under the Axa deal, as many as 5,000 descendants will split \$11 million, while \$3 million will go toward French Armenian charities and the rest to pay attorneys and other costs. "We wanted the matter resolved, and we were able to come to an agreement," said plaintiffs' attorney Vartkes Yeghiayan. Axa admitted no wrongdoing and said it was "very happy" to have reached the accord.

The Armenian pontiff, Catholicos Aram I, said that the settlements were a step toward international recognition that the bloodshed was an act of genocide and maintains that Armenians were killed in civil unrest during the collapse of the empire.

Alfassa related the history of the Ottoman Empire and modern Turkey. "When the city of Salonika was destroyed 90% of the records were lost," he said. Sephardic Jews come from such areas as Syria, Iran, Iraq, Morocco, Greece and Turkey.


Shirley Michael, Treasurer reported JGSGO has \$1,722.04 in its account.



Attention Genealogy Junkies

Genealogy junkies should reserve the month of August 2006 for their genealogy fix. Two major conferences will be held at that time.

The 26th annual International Conference on Jewish Genealogy will be held in New York City from August 13-18. The event is sponsored by the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, the umbrella group of nearly 80 Jewish genealogical societies throughout the world. The conference hotel, the Marriott Marquis, is located in the center of the tourist district. In 1999, 1,200 people attended the New York conference. It is not unreasonable that more than 2,000 people will attend this time. Dr. Allen Weinstein, Archivist of the United States, will be the keynote speaker. The host society, Jewish Genealogical Society Inc, is the largest Jewish genealogical society in the world. Watch their web site, <http://www.igsny.org>, for additional information as it develops.

The annual "Conference for the Nation's Genealogists" of the Federation of Genealogical Societies will be in Boston from August 30-September 2. FGS is the umbrella group of nearly 600 genealogical societies located in the U.S. and Canada. The conference will be in the Hynes Convention Center. The Boston Sheraton Hotel in the Back Bay area of Boston is the host hotel. New England Historic and Genealogical Society, the host society, is the largest genealogical society in the U.S.. It is anticipated that 3,000 people will attend that conference. It is unfortunate that few Jewish genealogists attend FGS conferences. They are of much value for lectures on subjects not covered as well at IAJGS conferences, such as methodology. There is a huge vendor exhibit hall that typically includes about 50 vendors (Avotaynu will be exhibiting in Boston). I met Neil Abelson of Long Island, New York, at the FGS conference in Salt Lake City. It was the first time he attended a national conference other than IAJGS conferences. He made the comment that I hear from most Jewish genealogists who attend an FGS conference for the first time; that he does not understand why so few Jews attend such a worthwhile event.
